## General Rules for Fair Exhibits

1. **PREMIUM CHECKS WILL BE PAID PENDING PA STATE BUDGET. CHECKS MAY NOT BE MAILED TO EXHIBITORS UNTIL AFTER NOVEMBER 1. All checks must be cashed within 1 year of the issue date, or they will become forfeit.**
2. All classes are open to the public.
3. Age groups for Department 11, Sections 1 to 7 is 13 to 18. Section 8 is for Youth 12 and under. Age is determined as of entry date. Please see Livestock Rules for Youth eligibility ages.
4. **Youth must enter in the youth classes if class is available in age group. If no class is available in the Youth classes, entry may be made in adult classes.**
5. Read premium book carefully to follow all the rules and regulations. If an entry calls for five specimens, exhibit that number, do not enter four or six. Your exhibit will be disqualified for having a number of specimens other than that stipulated.
6. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any or all entries.
7. All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since last year's Fair. If Fair management believes any of the exhibits were shown in previous years, those entries may be refused.
8. Complete baked goods must be brought to the Fair. After judging, the Fair may display only a portion of the product for the Fair event.
9. Baked goods become the property of the Fair.
10. Send pre-registration forms for Fair Exhibits to Linda Byers, 435 Passauer Rd, Tionesta, PA 16353, by June 20. All exhibitors must give complete mailing address to receive Premium checks.
11. All exhibits must be entered between 1 PM and 7 PM on Sunday, June 30. **ABSOLUTELY NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.**
12. All exhibits, excluding livestock, are to be left in place until 8 PM, Saturday, July 6. They may be removed between 8 PM and 10 PM.
13. Fair officials have the right to remove any exhibit unfit for show.
14. An exhibitor can enter only one exhibit in each class, with the exception of livestock.
15. Every precaution will be taken for the protection of articles on exhibit, but Wolf's Corners Fair will assume no responsibility for any loss or damage that may occur.
16. In the event of no competition in a class, a ribbon and premium are awarded at the discretion of the judge. Judges' decisions are final.
17. Exhibitors staying overnight must stay in the camping area. See Camping Registration form at end of booklet for pricing. Children under 18 years of age, staying in campground overnight, must be supervised by an adult.
18. Any misconduct of exhibitors during the Fair will result in the person being asked to leave the Fairgrounds.
19. **NO PETS OR DOGS ON MIDWAY OR BARNES. ALL DOGS IN CAMPING AREA MUST BE ON A LEASH AT ALL TIMES AND WEAR PROPER LICENSE. MUST HAVE CURRENT RABIES SHOT. NO EXCEPTIONS.**
20. Advanced registration is possible by completing the Registration Form in this paper. Pre-Registration is appreciated and saves you time.
21. Ribbons and premiums for the first three places will be given in each class, unless otherwise noted.

## General Livestock Rules

### REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL EXHIBITION ANIMALS ON THE GROUNDS

1. **PLEASE NOTE – ALL VETERINARY REQUIREMENTS APPLY TO ALL ANIMALS ON THE GROUNDS.**
2. **Veterinarian of Record for the Fair – Dr. Dan Robertson of Northfolk Veterinary of Brookville, PA. We thank him for all of his help and time.**
3. ALL LIVESTOCK ENTRIES MUST BE SENT TO YOUTH AND AG, 2823 LAKE LUCY RD, TIONESTA, PA 16353 by JUNE 1. Please include Veterinary Client Form. No entries accepted without form.
4. **Entered livestock and equines must be on the grounds no earlier than Noon or no later than 3 PM, Sunday, June 30 and MUST remain on display until Sunday, July 7.**
5. All vet paperwork will need to be checked by designated Youth and Ag official before the animals are unloaded. All livestock must be seen by Fair vet prior to being unloaded.

6. All market animals will need to be weighed (pigs, cows, goats, sheep, rabbits etc.)
7. **ALL OUT OF STATE OWNERS MUST CALL (814) 227-6447 PRIOR TO ENTRY FOR ADDITIONAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS.**
8. All exhibitors must give correct mailing address in order to receive Premium checks or premiums will be forfeit. **All checks must be cashed within 1 year of the issue date, or they will become forfeit.**
9. **All livestock (except Rabbits) need a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, dated after May 1, 2023. Any required vaccinations must be in the current owner's name. Please see individual department for state regulations.**
10. Youth classes are open to any youth 18 years of age or younger as of July 4<sup>th</sup> of the fair year. Youth are restricted to exhibiting in youth classes when available. Youth may show in General Exhibitor classes only if no youth class is available. Classes labeled Youth & Ag are restricted to Wolf's Corners Youth & Ag Club Members only.
11. Each exhibitor is responsible for his/her own feed for animals. Animals must be fed and watered at least once every 12 hours.
12. Each exhibitor is responsible for having his or her pen cleaned by 8 PM on Sunday, July 7. If pen is not cleaned by this time, exhibitor will forfeit all premiums.
13. Livestock must be in stall at all times, unless grooming, showing or exercising.
14. If an animal causes damage to the barn(s), the owner may be held liable for the repair costs to the barn(s).
15. Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious or external parasitic disease and animals restricted by quarantine may not be assembled for show purposes.
16. Animals presented for exhibition will be subject to inspection by show officials and will be rejected if evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease is apparent.
17. All animals must have an ear tag or tattoo to be exhibited, in accordance with state rules and regulations.
18. All livestock offered for premiums must have been the registered property of the owner(s) for thirty (30) days or longer prior to opening date of the Fair.
19. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship form must accompany each animal and must be presented upon arrival at all exhibitions in Pennsylvania.
20. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
21. Every entry must clearly display the entry tag showing species and breed name, owners name and class entry.
22. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to correctly name the breed or sex of livestock he/she is entering. Improper entry may result in disqualification.
23. Fair will provide sawdust as bedding.
24. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any or all entries.
25. Showmanship Classes will be grouped by Judges based on age and ability. All Showmanship Classes in all species or ages pays 1<sup>st</sup> - \$10, 2<sup>nd</sup> - \$9, 3<sup>rd</sup> - \$8, 4<sup>th</sup> - \$7, 5<sup>th</sup> - \$6.
26. No exhibitor shall communicate with the judge during the time of determining the rewards except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premiums to which he/she would otherwise be entitled.
27. No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged. Only exhibitor permitted in ring with animal during judging.
28. All livestock must be shown clean and dry.
29. Appropriate show attire: Long pants, show shirt with sleeves (no tank tops) and hard sole shoes (No commercial logos or midriiffs.) If in other attire, exhibitor will be asked to change.
30. Livestock will be accepted until stalls are filled. Exhibitors will accept stalls without controversy. Stalls are provided for animals only, not tack or supplies.

## **Animal Judging Contest**

Premiums: 1<sup>st</sup> - \$20, 2<sup>nd</sup> - \$18, 3<sup>rd</sup> - \$15, 4<sup>th</sup> - \$10, 5<sup>th</sup> - \$8

1. Contest is open to everyone.
2. Contestants are provided a card to judge each designated class of animals provided by the Fair for viewing in person or by virtual presentation.
3. The contestant's results are compared to the official judge's results for the class.
4. The winner is determined by the card that most closely matches the judge's card overall.
5. Any tie is determined by a random drawing.
6. The number and species of classes will be determined on fair date and posted at the barn at least 1 hour prior to the event.
7. Registration is in barn at the time of posting until 15 minutes before the event.

Class 1. Youth Contestant over 4 years to 18

Class 2. Adult Contestant over 18

## **Wolf's Corners Youth and Ag Club**

Wolf's Corners maintains a Youth and Ag Club open to any youth 18 years old or under on January 1<sup>st</sup> of the fair year interested in Fair Activities, Livestock, and Agricultural issues. Participants need not own livestock. The Youth and Ag do several service projects and educational activities during the year including the annual Livestock and Project sale at the fair. Information can be obtained by calling 814-227-6447.

1. Youth and Ag members can compete in this section with their club projects only.
2. Each member can exhibit 2 projects, one Livestock and 1 General Exhibit. Sub-classes will mirror the premium classes for Regular Departments
3. All projects must be ear tagged or tattooed and verified by club leaders by May 1.

## **Department 1. Horses**

### **Pennsylvania Equine Animals: These apply to all animals on the grounds including pulls and fun show**

#### **Requirements:**

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2024 is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI..
3. An *Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship* (VCPR) form must accompany each animal, and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. It is required that all equine animals test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results should accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals three months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and Veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a Rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse – such a lip, tattoos, brands, or microchips.

#### **ADDITIONAL RULES FOR ALL HORSES**

1. Any exhibitor failing to meet basic, daily sanitation requirements will be asked to leave.
2. No double stalling. No un-weaned foals permitted. No stalls may be torn apart or altered.
3. No Equine showing any clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to any show or fair event.
4. Veterinarian should be consulted if health of horse is in question.

5. Horse stalls will be assigned by Fair staff. Stall changes are permitted by Fair staff only.
6. Horses entered as pairs or teams must be owned by one person.
7. All animals on the grounds must be shown.
8. Rules apply to all horses and ponies.
9. No entry fees for halter or hitch classes. Other entry fees are as listed.
10. Vehicles are limited to one rider and one driver while in show ring.
11. Anyone not in ring when judging begins may be disqualified.
12. Grades and purebreds will compete against each other.
13. All horses on grounds must be halter broke.
14. Fair reserves the right to ask destructive, dangerous, or horses with vices to leave immediately.
15. Horses will be limited to a walk in the barn areas. The chairman may declare certain areas or times as not suitable for riding or driving.
16. Exhibitors will provide their own feed, hay, tie ropes, etc.
17. Exhibitors must clean stalls before leaving or no premium will be paid.
18. Adult is defined as 18 or over as of July 4. Youth is 18 or younger as of July 4 of the fair year. Youth are restricted to showing in youth classes when available. Youth may show in open classes if no youth class is available.
19. Helmets, hard soled shoes with heels, and appropriate attire are mandatory for anyone 18 and under. See General Livestock Rules. No tank tops, shorts or bare midriffs.
20. No stallions permitted on fairgrounds.
21. Halter class horses will be shown by breed for Drafts and by size for all others as listed. The Judges or Chairman may add or combine classes at his discretion to achieve suitable competition.
22. Fair reserves the right to refuse any and all entries.
23. No tying horses to trees on grounds.

### **Section 1. Horse/Mini Horse Pull Contests**

#### Rules for Mini Horse Pulls

1. Premiums – Each team to receive an equal share of the \$600 prize money for each Class.
2. \$5 Entry fee for each team to be added to the prize money.
3. Ribbons will be awarded through 4<sup>th</sup> place.
4. HEALTH – All minis must have required health documentation upon arriving on the fairgrounds.
5. Mini team must pull a distance of 10' for a full pull.
6. The pulling track will be 15 feet wide.
7. Team will have 3 attempts at each load; with the option to pass the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> attempts. Teams must stay hitched for the 2<sup>nd</sup> attempt unless there is not ample space provided.
8. If a 3<sup>rd</sup> attempt is necessary, teamster will have the choice of direction given there is ample space provided.
9. Teams will be allowed 3 tries to hitch to the sled per attempt. Over 3 tries will result in loss of attempt and no distance will be given for that attempt.
10. If the team is unsuccessful to make a full pull, the greatest distance will be their placing distance.
11. If there is a tie in distances, the next greatest distance will be the placing distance.
12. Each teamster will be permitted two helpers.
13. Any whipping, line slapping, smacking, kicking, etc. will result in the teamster being immediately ejected from the competition with no distance given for that load.
14. Teamster and helper may not be ahead of the double trees or it shall result in loss of attempt with no distance given for that attempt.
15. No open-faced bridles are to be used. If open faced bridles are used, the team will not be allowed to participate in the competition.
16. Drivers or helpers may not head the horses at any time while they are in pulling area except if there are problems with the horses and/or harness. If the teamster or helper does have to head the horses, the teamster must take the team back outside the pulling area and return in.
17. Drivers will be allowed to call on the team; excluding profane or offensive language.
18. Drivers that lose control of the team during any point of the pull will be ejected from the competition and no distance for that load will be given.
19. In case of a breakdown before team is hitched to the sled, the teamster will be allotted time to fix it. The pull will proceed and that teamster will move to the end of the order for that load.
20. In case of a breakdown while the team is hitched to the sled, the teamster will be permitted to unhook to fix it and the distance for that pull will stand. The teamster will automatically forfeit their 2<sup>nd</sup> attempt if breakdown occurs during the 1<sup>st</sup> attempt.



21. There will be no switching of drivers after the 2<sup>nd</sup> load. If a change in drivers is necessary the judges must be informed prior to the team hitching for their 1<sup>st</sup> attempt on the 2<sup>nd</sup> load.

#### Class 1. Mini Horse Pull

Measurement: Three classes of minis will be pulled, classes being as follows

- A. 34" and under – Minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair. The maximum height for this class will be 35 3/8" WITH SHOES. Unshod minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair with the maximum height being 34".
- B. 34" to 36" – Minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair. The maximum height for this class will be 37 3/8" WITH SHOES. Unshod minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair with the maximum height being 36".
- C. 36" to 38" – Minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair. The maximum height for this class will be 39 3/8" WITH SHOES. Unshod minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair with the maximum height being 38".
- D. **ALL** minis will be required to measure before entering the contest.

Class 2. Lightweight

Premiums for Lightweight and Heavyweight pulls: 1<sup>st</sup> - \$400, 2<sup>nd</sup> - \$350, 3<sup>rd</sup> - \$300

#### **Section 2. Halter Classes**

Premiums: 1<sup>st</sup> - \$25, 2<sup>nd</sup> - \$22, 3<sup>rd</sup> - \$20, 4<sup>th</sup> - \$18, 5<sup>th</sup> - \$16

#### Rules for Halter Classes

1. Judge – Jessica Dicorpo
2. Horses not staying at the Fair for all 7 days are only eligible for ½ premiums in all Halter Classes and are not eligible for Best of Show judging.
3. All horses (including minis and ponies) under the age of 1 must be handled by an adult (18 years and over).
4. Adults may not aid those under 18 unless requested by the judge, while judging is conducted. Such help will be penalized.

#### Size Classifications

- a. Mini horses must be 34 inches and under.
- b. Mini Oversize horses are 35 inches to 10 hands
- c. Ponies are above 10 hands up to and including 14.2 hands.
- d. Light weight horse classes are intended for riding horses over 14.2 hands.
- e. Heavy weight horse classes are intended for draft and other work horse breeds.

Class 1. Filly – under 1 (handler must be 18 years or older)

Class 2. Colt - under 1 (handler must be 18 years or older)

Class 3. Mare – 1 to 3 years

Class 4. Gelding – 1 to 3 years

Class 5. Mare – 4 to 9 years

Class 6. Gelding – 4 to 9 years

Class 7. Mare – 10 to 14 years

Class 8. Gelding – 10 to 14 years

Class 9. Mare – 15 to 19 years

Class 10. Gelding – 15 to 19 years

Class 11. Mare – 20 to 25 years

Class 12. Gelding – 20 to 25 years

Class 13. Mare – over 25 years

Class 14. Gelding – over 25 years

Class 15. Best Matched Heavyweight Team

### **Section 3. Fun Horse Show**

Premiums: 1<sup>st</sup> - \$6, 2<sup>nd</sup> - \$5, 3<sup>rd</sup> - \$4, 4<sup>th</sup> - \$3, 5<sup>th</sup> - \$2, 6<sup>th</sup> - \$1

#### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

1. When hauling horses to show, vet paperwork is mandatory.
2. Any horses not staying at the Fair for all 7 days are only eligible for ½ premiums in all Fun Show classes.
3. Helmets and hard soled shoes are mandatory for anyone 18 and under. Appropriate attire required. See General Livestock rules.
4. All horses must have proof of coggins on site.
5. Show committee reserves the right to change or combine any classes.
6. Age Groups are as follows:
  - a. Lead Line, may not show in any other classes
  - b. Youth 1 – 12 and Under
  - c. Youth 2 – 13 to 18
  - d. Youth 3 – 14 to 18
  - e. Adult – 19 and Over – May be divided by age based on participants.

- Class 2. Pole Bending – Youth 1
- Class 3. Pole Bending – Youth 2
- Class 4. Pole Bending – Youth 3
- Class 5. Pole Bending – Lead Line
- Class 6. Cloverleaf Barrels – Adult
- Class 7. Cloverleaf Barrels – Youth 1
- Class 8. Cloverleaf Barrels – Youth 2
- Class 9. Cloverleaf Barrels – Youth 3

#### ADDITIONAL RULES FOR SWINE

1. No swine species shall be exhibited in Pennsylvania unless each animal:
  - Is accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) issued within 14 days of the exhibition;

- Is permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI;
  - Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
2. All breeding swine exhibitions are to occur prior to the arrival of any market swine:
- a. Breeding swine must be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.
  - b. Breeding swine animal exhibitions shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the fairgrounds whether unloaded from a trailer or not and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.
  - c. Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays which are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as, reasonable precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display.
3. All market swine exhibited in Department sponsored market shows shall move as all in and all out directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.
4. Non- PDA sponsored shows including jackpot shows and 4-H round-ups, not occurring during a PDA sponsored fair or show are exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement only if the following conditions are adhered to:
- a. As is stated above, the swine shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 14 days of the exhibition and shall be permanently identified by an 840 series radio frequency (RFID) identification ear tag.
  - b. Arrival, exhibition and departure of the swine occur within a 72-hour window. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the exhibition grounds, whether unloaded from a trailer or not, and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.
  - c. There is no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions.
  - d. An Accredited Veterinarian or trained swine health monitor visually inspects the animals prior to unloading, and they are found to be free of signs of contagious disease.
  - e. An accredited Veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall monitor and record the health of the pigs daily for signs of contagious disease and the accredited Veterinarian shall immediately report all suspicious disease to the State Animal Health Official.
  - f. A Veterinary-client-patient-relationship is established between the show committee/management staff and an accredited Veterinarian, and that Veterinarian is readily available for health monitoring, emergency coverage, treatment, follow up evaluation, and prompt reporting of suspicious disease to the State Animal Health Official.

**ADDITIONAL RULES FOR POULTRY**

1. Entries will be received until such time as the cooping capacity is reached.
2. Efforts will be made to coop singly. The right is reserved to place in one coop more than one bird of the same variety if owned by the same exhibitor.
3. A bird can only compete for one prize, except as provided for in special awards.
4. Exhibitors must furnish a substantial water cup.
5. Entered specimen must be bona fide property of exhibitor and have been hatched in Pennsylvania.
6. During the continuance of the show, all birds will be examined carefully each day. Birds showing signs of disease will be segregated and properly cared for or returned to the owner at his expense.
7. Birds will be handled only by the judge or authorized Fair official.
8. Premiums will be awarded only on animals or birds exhibited in their proper classes.
9. Entries will be accepted and premiums paid only on breeds, varieties and colors listed under the conditions noted in the Fair's premium book.
10. The management reserves the right to reduce the number of entries from one party if the cooping facilities are exhausted.
11. All Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, and upland game birds entering an exhibition must bear an official PDA-issued leg band. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader). Pigeons and doves must bear a unique individual identification leg band but do not have to be identified with an official PDA leg band.
12. An owner-endorsed Poultry Health Certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health chart or



CVI) must accompany all Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites; and pigeons/doves; and hatching eggs. The certificate must include the following:

- Name and location of exhibition; and
- Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and
- A statement that their entries and their flock of origin are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases; and
- Owner signature and date of that signature.

13. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.

14. Avian Influenza Clean Testing and Verification: All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian.

- All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites, (pigeons/doves excluded), and their hatching eggs for exhibition must originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 30 days prior to opening date of the exhibition. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds. For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing instead of blood samples, and the swabs may be tested using PCR techniques. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in the same tube for testing. Untested birds shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before the show.

15. Pullorum-Typhoid Testing and Verification (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded for exhibition). All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian.

- Poultry, including chickens, turkeys, upland game birds, and ratites (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded) and their hatching eggs must originate from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Program (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants) or from a flock in good standing in the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was done, the most recent NPIP 9-2 form or state equivalent form must accompany the birds or hatching eggs. (copy acceptable), Test results must be negative. If birds are less than one year of age and all originate from an NPIP Clean hatchery, they do not have to be tested for pullorum-typhoid if they are accompanied by an NPIP 9-3 form from that hatchery and any additions to the flock were also from NPIP Clean sources. The NPIP number must be noted on the report for NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean flocks;
- All individual birds (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded) for exhibition and birds providing hatching eggs (maximum of 300) must have had a pullorum-typhoid test within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report, or state equivalent form for the rapid test (copies acceptable). Test results must be negative. The following age restrictions apply:
  - Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
  - Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.
  - Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.
  - Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.
  - All birds not meeting these age restrictions are exempt from pullorum-typhoid testing requirements.
  - If all of the birds going to the exhibit are below the minimum testing age for pullorum-typhoid, at least 10% of the birds of testing age in the flock shall be tested within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition, (Maximum 300 birds.)

16. Testing specifics/Records requirements

a. Sample collectors and testers must maintain records of animal identification, approved rapid testing, and any other records required by the Domestic Animal Law, and any order issued by the Department for a minimum of two years and must make records available to the Department upon request.

b. National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) protocols for sample collection, including the number of swabs/tubes of viral transport media, and testing shall be followed. All samples must be tested at a NAHLN laboratory. (Excluding the Pullorum-typhoid rapid whole blood plate agglutination test that may be conducted at farm)

5. The Fair and Superintendent will use diligence to ensure the safety of all rabbits/guinea pigs after their arrival and placement, but in no case will they be responsible for loss or damage.

6. Fair will provide pens.

## 2024 PA Preferred® Junior Baking Contest Cookies, Brownies and Bars

The goal of the PA Preferred® Baking Contest is to encourage young people across the Commonwealth to participate in Pennsylvania’s agricultural fairs by showcasing Pennsylvania grown and produced products in their contest entries.

**RULES:**

1. Open to any individual amateur baker (ages 8 through 18 at the time of the fair’s contest) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred® Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2024.
3. Entry must be six (6) individual sized portions of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
4. The Cookies, Brownies or Bars, and any fillings and frostings, must be made from scratch with edible ingredients. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.). Any decorations must just be edible.
5. At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally produced ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
6. A PA Preferred® logo is not required because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (see attached example). Contact [RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov](mailto:RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov) for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
7. Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
8. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" sheets of paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally produced ingredient must be clearly listed along with the name of the source that made/grew the product (ex: PA Preferred Milk – Galliker’s brand or Apples - Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant’s name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
9. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

The scarecrow contest exhibit is family friendly. The Fair reserves the right to disqualify entries they feel to be distasteful or not family-friendly. **Advertising, political or religious statements will not be allowed, nor bloody or violent themes.**

**Eligibility:** The Scarecrow Contest is open to all ages, businesses, organizations and groups. One entry per class.

**Entry Fee:** FREE! There is NO cost to enter the contest. To participate, entrants must submit completed registration form and have their scarecrow on display by the required time.

**Construction:** Scarecrows must be durable and able to stand independently while holding up to sun, wind and very likely rain showers. Use care in choosing your materials. **OWNER ENDORSED AVIAN HEALTH CERTIFICATE AND BIOSECURITY STATEMENT**  
**2024**

**Introduction:** Highly pathogenic avian influenza is a fatal and contagious disease of poultry, and has led to the loss of more than 65 million birds in the US since 2022. The virus causing this disease can be spread by infected poultry, on poultry products such as feathers and eggs, on clothing and other fomites such as packing materials, and through the air. However, if all protocols for reducing the risk of spreading disease are followed, certain poultry, feathers and eggs may be exhibited, at the Department's discretion.

A completed Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement must accompany all avian species (including poultry), eggs, and feathers to a Pennsylvania exhibition. The certificate must be presented to exhibition management prior to cooping of all avian species or displaying of eggs or feathers. This form must be endorsed with the bird, egg, or feather owner's signature.

*Avian.* Related to birds.

*Poultry.* The term "poultry" includes all domesticated fowl, including chickens, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, waterfowl, and game birds (pheasants, partridge, quail, grouse, and guineas); but excludes doves, pigeons, psittacine and passerine birds.

As established in the current *Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture Animal Health Requirements and Recommendations for Animal Exhibition, Including Commercial Exhibition*, an Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement must accompany avian species and poultry products to all animal exhibitions in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

**3. Requirements for Exhibition of Feathers, Eggs, and Poultry in Pennsylvania**

**a. Ornamental Feathers:**

(i) Sourced in the United States.

- (ii) Ornamental feathers sourced from poultry to be entered into a competition or used to produce jewelry or other items to be exhibited/sold shall be free of visible manure, litter, or other debris.
- (iii) Transport container shall have been cleaned and disinfected before being used to transport feathers to the exhibition.
- (iv) An Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) shall accompany the feathers. If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the feathers.
- (v) Ornamental feathers to be entered into a competition or used to produce jewelry or other items to be exhibited/sold shall originate from a flock which is not known to be infected with avian influenza. This requirement can be met by using one of the following methods:
  - (aa) Ornamental feathers sourced from poultry shall originate from a flock which had a negative AI test (see testing requirements for poultry below (section c) within the 14 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The feathers shall be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). OR
  - (bb) Ornamental feathers sourced from poultry to be entered into a competition or used to produce jewelry or other items to be exhibited/sold shall be clean, and held in a clean area separate from poultry or other poultry products for at least 120 days at a minimum of 68 degrees Fahrenheit before exhibition. The date the feathers were moved to a holding area, along with the holding temperature, shall be included on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement.

**b. Unfertilized Poultry Eggs for Exhibition:**

- (i) Eggs shall be washed and sanitized in a 100-200 ppm chlorine solution or other EPA-approved disinfectant which is effective in destroying influenza virus, and dried before being placed in a carton.
- (ii) Eggs shall be packaged in a new cardboard or Styrofoam carton or in a plastic carton which was cleaned, disinfected, and dried, for entry into an event.
- (iii) An Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) shall accompany the eggs. If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the eggs.
- (iv) The source flock shall have had a negative AI test (see testing requirements for poultry below (section c) within the 14 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition.

**c. Poultry for Exhibition:**

- (i) Poultry may be exhibited only if they will be moved immediately after judging directly to a facility for slaughter from the show grounds. All poultry exhibited in Pennsylvania at Department sponsored or funded exhibitions shall move as all-in and all-out directly to a Department or United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment.
- (ii) Arrival, exhibition and departure of the poultry shall occur within a 72-hour window. The 72 hours begin when the first poultry arrive on the show grounds, whether unloaded or not, and ends when the last poultry physically leave the premises in a vehicle.
- (iii) All poultry entering a show shall be identified with official Department leg bands.
- (iv) An Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) shall accompany the poultry. If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the poultry.

- (v) All poultry on the show grounds shall be monitored for signs of illness, and any signs of illness shall be reported to the Department immediately (717-772-2852).
- (vi) All poultry on the show grounds shall be displayed behind barriers such as ropes to prevent public access to the poultry, with signage to prevent the public from crossing the barrier.
- (vii) Conveyances shall be cleaned and disinfected before loading to transport poultry to the show, and after returning to the premises of origin.
- (viii) **Avian Influenza Testing and Verification:**
  - (aa) All samples shall be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian and shall be tested in a National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) laboratory.
  - (bb) All poultry for exhibition shall originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 14 days prior to opening date of the exhibition.
  - (cc) For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples shall be collected for testing. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in the same tube for testing.
  - (dd) For chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites, blood samples (AGID testing) or tracheal or oropharyngeal swab samples (PCR testing) are acceptable samples. Samples from more than one species may not be combined in the same tube for testing.
  - (ee) The poultry shall be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results shall be negative.
  - (ff) If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds of age.
  - (gg) Untested birds shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before the show.

**4. Verification of avian health status:** All poultry for exhibition and all source flocks for eggs and feathers being exhibited or displayed are free from evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.

**5. Verification of biosecurity:** Biosecurity measures for all feathers, eggs, and poultry being exhibited or displayed include:

- (i) A biosecurity plan is followed on the premises where the source flock is located, to include at minimum:
  - (aa) Visitors to bird areas are restricted.
  - (bb) Anyone visiting the poultry area should have clean clothing and should have used hand sanitizer or washed their hands before handling poultry or poultry products.
  - (cc) Designated footwear or footwear that has been cleaned and disinfected is worn in the poultry area. A clear line of separation exists at the entrance to the poultry area.
- (ii) All feathers and eggs are maintained apart from the poultry flock prior to entry into the exhibition.
- (iii) All conveyances, including transport vehicles, coops, crates, boxes, and other containers used to transport animals or products to the show are cleaned to be free of visible manure, litter, or other debris.
- (iv) All coops, crates, boxes, and other containers used to transport animals or products to the show shall be disinfected with a product effective against the avian influenza virus and allowed to dry before use.
- (v) All exhibitors should follow the biosecurity guidelines: *Keeping Your Show Animals Healthy-Guidelines for Exhibitors* (11/28/23).
