General Rules for Fair Exhibits

1. **PREMIUM CHECKS WILL BE PAID PENDING PA STATE BUDGET. CHECKS MAY NOT BE MAILED UNTIL AFTER NOVEMBER 1 TO ALL EXHIBITORS.**
2. All classes are open to the general public.
3. Age groups for Department 11, Sections 1 to 7 is 13 to 18. Section 8 is for Youth 12 and under. Age is determined as of entry date. Please see Livestock Rules for Youth eligibility ages.
4. **Youth must enter in the youth classes if class is available in age group. If no class is available in the Youth classes, entry may be made in adult classes.**
5. Read premium book carefully in order to follow all the rules and regulations. If an entry calls for five specimens, exhibit that number, do not enter four or six. Your exhibit will be disqualified for having a number of specimens other than that stipulated.
6. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any or all entries.
7. All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since last year's Fair. If Fair management believes any of the exhibits were shown in previous years, those entries may be refused.
8. Complete baked goods must be brought to the Fair. After judging, the Fair may display only a portion of the product for the Fair event.
9. Baked goods become the property of the Fair.
10. Send pre-registration forms for Fair Exhibits to Linda Byers, 435 Passauer Rd, Tionesta, PA 16353, by June 20. All exhibitors must give complete mailing address in order to receive Premium checks.
11. All exhibits must be entered between 1 PM and 7 PM on Sunday, June 30. **ABSOLUTELY NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.**
12. All exhibits, excluding livestock, are to be left in place until 6 PM, Saturday, July 6. They may be removed between 6 PM and 8 PM.
13. Fair officials have the right to remove any exhibit unfit for show.
14. An exhibitor can enter only one exhibit in each class, with the exception of livestock.
15. Every precaution will be taken for the protection of articles on exhibit, but Wolf's Corners Fair will assume no responsibility for any loss or damage that may occur.
16. In the event of no competition in a class, a ribbon and premium is awarded at the discretion of the judge. Judges' decisions are final.
17. Exhibitors staying overnight must stay in the camping area. See Camping Registration form at end of booklet for pricing. Children under 18 years of age, staying in campground overnight, must be supervised by an adult.
18. Any misconduct of exhibitors during the Fair will result in the person being asked to leave the Fairgrounds.
19. **NO PETS OR DOGS ON MIDWAY OR BARNS. ALL DOGS IN CAMPING AREA MUST BE ON A LEASH AT ALL TIMES AND WEAR PROPER LICENSE. MUST HAVE CURRENT RABIES SHOT. NO EXCEPTIONS.**
20. Advanced registration is possible by completing the Registration Form in this paper. Pre-Registration is appreciated and saves you time.
21. Ribbons and premiums for the first three places will be given in each class, unless otherwise noted.

General Livestock Rules
REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL EXHIBITION ANIMALS

1. ALL LIVESTOCK ENTRIES MUST BE SENT TO RAQUEL MCFARLAND, 987 RED BRUSH RD, TIONESTA, PA 16353 by JUNE 1. Please include Veterinary Client Form.
2. **Entered livestock and equines must be on the grounds no earlier than 12 Noon or no later than 8 PM, Saturday, June 29 and MUST remain on display until Sunday, July 7.**
3. All vet paperwork will need to be checked by Jenn Zuck or Steph Burkett before the animals are unloaded.
4. All market animals will need to be weighed (pigs, cows, goats, sheep etc.)
5. **ALL OUT OF STATE OWNERS MUST CONTACT JENN ZUCK OR STEPH BURKETT PRIOR TO ENTRY FOR ADDITIONAL HEALTH REQUIRMENTS.**
6. All exhibitors must give mailing address in order to receive Premium checks.
7. **All livestock (except Rabbits and Poultry) need a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, dated within 60 days of the opening date of the Fair. All livestock (except Market Animals) need a Rabies Certificate, dated within 1 year of the opening date of the Fair, in the current owner's name. Please see individual Departments for more specific rules.**
8. Livestock Departments 2 thru 9 will be shown in two sections, Youth and Open Exhibitor Classes. To enter as a youth, use the Departments and Classes listed for Open Exhibitors and please provide the youth age at the bottom of the form so we may properly classify youth exhibitors. Youth classes are open to any youth 19 years of age or younger as of July 4th of the fair year. Youth are restricted to exhibiting in youth classes when available. Youth may show in General Exhibitor classes only if no youth class is available. Classes labeled Youth & Ag are restricted to Wolf's Corners Youth & Ag Club Members.
9. Each exhibitor is responsible for his/her own feed for animals.
10. Each exhibitor is responsible for having his or her pen cleaned by 8 PM on Sunday, July 7. If pen is not cleaned by this time, exhibitor will forfeit all premiums.
11. If an animal causes damage to the barn(s), the owner may be held liable for the repair costs to the barn(s).
12. Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious or external parasitic disease and animals restricted by quarantine may not be assembled for show purposes.
13. Animals presented for exhibition will be subject to inspection by show officials and will be rejected if evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease is apparent.
14. All animals must have an ear tag or tattoo to be exhibited, in accordance with state rules and regulations.
15. All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owner(s) for thirty (30) days or longer prior to opening date of the Fair.
16. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship form must accompany each animal and must be presented upon arrival at all exhibitions in Pennsylvania.
17. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
18. Every entry must clearly display the entry tag showing species and breed name.
19. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to correctly name the breed or sex of livestock he/she is entering. Improper entry may result in disqualification.
20. Fair will provide sawdust as bedding.
21. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any or all entries.
22. Showmanship Classes will be grouped by Judges based on age and ability. All Showmanship Classes in all species or ages pays 1st - \$6, 2nd - \$5, 3rd - \$4, 4th - \$3, 5th - \$2.
23. No exhibitor shall communicate with the judge during the time of determining the rewards except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premiums to which he/she would otherwise be entitled.
24. No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged. Only exhibitor permitted in ring with animal during judging.

Good Housekeeping Awards

Good Housekeeping Awards will be paid for Horse Stalls, Livestock Stalls, and Cages on a daily basis. No Good Housekeeping Awards will be given the first or last day of the Fair. Daily winners will be posted in the barn area and premiums included in the checks when issued. All groups will be judged using the following point system.

Cleanliness of bedding	15 pts
Entry Card and Ribbons properly displayed	20 pts
Grain and hay feed presentable	10 pts

Wolf's Corners Youth and Ag Club

Wolf's Corners maintains a Youth and Ag Club open to any youth 18 years old or under on January 1st of the fair year interested in Fair Activities, Livestock, and Agricultural issues. Participants need not own livestock. The Youth and Ag do several service projects and educational activities during the year including the annual Livestock and Project sale at the fair. Information can be obtained by calling Jenn Zuck at 814-657-8878 or Steph Burkett at 814-316-3691.

1. Youth and Ag members can compete in this section with their club projects only.
2. Each member can exhibit 2 projects. Sub-classes will mirror the premium classes for Regular Departments
3. All projects must be ear tagged or tattooed and verified by club leaders by April 1.
4. Showmanship will be held immediately after livestock judging as listed. Premiums for Showmanship are as listed. Youth and Ag members can compete with General Exhibitors.

Department 1. Horses

Pennsylvania Equine Animals: These apply to all animals on the grounds including pulls, parade, and fun show

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2019 is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
3. An *Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship* (VCPR) form must accompany each animal, and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. All equine animals must be test negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a dam which meets the above requirements are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals three months of age and older. However, if a mare was currently vaccinated against rabies when she foaled, the foal is not required to be vaccinated until six months of age, with a second vaccination administered two-four weeks later. All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. The certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the original rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

ADDITIONAL RULES FOR ALL HORSES

1. No Equine showing any clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to any show or fair event.
2. Veterinarian should be consulted if health of horse is in question.
3. Horses will be housed by Fair Staff.
4. Horses entered as pairs or teams must be owned by one person.
5. All animals on the grounds must be shown.
6. Rules apply to all horses and ponies.
7. No entry fees for halter or hitch classes. Other entry fees are as listed.
8. Vehicles are limited to one rider and one driver while in show ring.
9. Anyone not in ring when judging begins may be disqualified.
10. Grades and purebreds will compete against each other.
11. All horses on grounds must be halter broke.
12. All horses on grounds must be haltered and tied to hitch rail when in stalls.
13. Fair reserves the right to ask destructive, dangerous, or horses with vices to leave immediately.
14. Horses will be limited to a walk in the barn areas. The chairman may declare certain areas or times as not suitable for riding or driving.
15. Exhibitors will provide their own feed, hay, tie ropes, etc.
16. Exhibitors must clean stalls before leaving or no premium will be paid.
17. Adult is defined as 19 or over as of July 4. Youth is 18 or younger as of July 4 of the fair year. Youth are restricted to showing in youth classes when available. Youth may show in open classes if no youth class is available.
18. Helmets and hard soled shoes are mandatory for anyone 18 and under.
19. No stallions permitted on fair grounds.
20. Halter class horses will be shown by breed for Drafts and by size for all others as listed. The Judges or Chairman may add or combine classes at his discretion to achieve suitable competition.
21. Fair reserves the right to refuse any and all entries.

Section 1. Horse/Mini Horse Pull Contests

Rules for Mini Horse Pulls

1. Premiums – Each team to receive an equal share of the \$600 prize money for each Class.
2. \$5 Entry fee for each team to be added to the prize money.
3. Ribbons will be awarded through 4th place.
4. HEALTH – All minis must have required health documentation upon arriving on the fair grounds.
5. Mini team must pull a distance of 10' for a full pull.
6. The pulling track will be 15 feet wide.
7. Team will have 3 attempts at each load; with the option to pass the 2nd and 3rd attempts. Teams must stay hitched for the 2nd attempt unless there is not ample space provided.
8. If a 3rd attempt is necessary, teamster will have the choice of direction given there is ample space provided.
9. Teams will be allowed 3 tries to hitch to the sled per attempt. Over 3 tries will result in loss of attempt and no distance will be given for that attempt.
10. If the team is unsuccessful to make a full pull, the greatest distance will be their placing distance.
11. If there is a tie in distances, the next greatest distance will be the placing distance.
12. Each teamster will be permitted two helpers.
13. Any whipping, line slapping, smacking, kicking, etc. will result in the teamster being immediately ejected from the competition with no distance given for that load.
14. Teamster and helper may not be ahead of the double trees or it shall result in loss of attempt with no distance given for that attempt.
15. No open faced bridles are to be used. If open faced bridles are used, the team will not be allowed to participate in the competition.
16. Drivers or helpers may not head the horses at any time while they are in pulling area except if there are problems with the horses and/or harness. If the teamster or helper does have to head the horses, the teamster must take the team back outside the pulling area and return in.
17. Drivers will be allowed to call on the team; excluding profane or offensive language.

18. Drivers that lose control of the team during any point of the pull will be ejected from the competition and no distance for that load will be given.
19. In case of a breakdown before team is hitched to the sled, the teamster will be allotted time to fix it. The pull will proceed and that teamster will move to the end of the order for that load.
20. In case of a breakdown while the team is hitched to the sled, the teamster will be permitted to unhook to fix it and the distance for that pull will stand. The teamster will automatically forfeit their 2nd attempt if breakdown occurs during the 1st attempt.
21. There will be no switching of drivers after the 2nd load. If a change in drivers is necessary the judges must be informed prior to the team hitching for their 1st attempt on the 2nd load.

Class 1. Mini Horse Pull – June 29, 3 PM

Measurement: Three classes of minis will be pulled, classes being as follows

- A. 34" and under – Minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair. The maximum height for this class will be 35 3/8" WITH SHOES. Unshod minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair with the maximum height being 34".
- B. 34" to 36" – Minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair. The maximum height for this class will be 37 3/8" WITH SHOES. Unshod minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair with the maximum height being 36".
- C. 36" to 38" – Minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair. The maximum height for this class will be 39 3/8" WITH SHOES. Unshod minis will be measured with their feet set squarely under their body and to the last mane hair with the maximum height being 38".

ALL minis will be required to measure before entering the contest.

Class 2. Lightweight – June 29, 6 PM

Class 3. Heavyweight – June 29, 8 PM

Premiums for Lightweight and Heavyweight pulls: 1st - \$250, 2nd - \$200, 3rd - \$160, 4th - \$140, 5th - \$90, 6th - \$80, 7th - \$70, 8th - \$60, 9th - \$50, 10th - \$40, \$20 merit money

Section 2. Halter Classes

Rules for Halter Classes

1. Horses not staying at the Fair for all 7 days are only eligible for ½ premiums in all Halter Classes.
2. All horses (including minis and ponies) under the age of 1 must be handled by an adult (18 years and over).
3. Mini horses must be 34 inches and under.
4. Ponies are above 35 inches, up to and including 14.2 hands.
5. Light weight horse classes are intended for riding horses.
6. Heavy weight horse classes are intended for draft and other work horse breeds.

Premiums: 1st - \$14, 2nd - \$12, 3rd - \$10, 4th - \$8, 5th - \$6 for Draft Horses
1st - \$12, 2nd - \$10, 3rd - \$8, 4th - \$6, 5th - \$4 for Saddle Horses and Donkeys
1st - \$6, 2nd - \$5, 3rd - \$4, 4th - \$3, 5th - \$2 for Minis

ADDITIONAL RULES FOR DAIRY CATTLE

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1 is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
3. An *Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship* (VCPR) form must accompany each animal, and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA-issued metal eartag; or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the tattoo is legible and the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate; or
 - A breed registration eartag if the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate; or
 - An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID).
5. All cattle must be born before April 1st of the year of the fair.

A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (*market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement*). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

ADDITIONAL RULES FOR BEEF CATTLE

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1 is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.

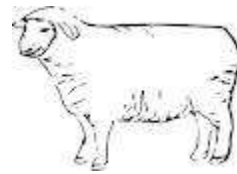

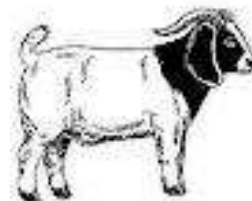

ADDITIONAL RULES FOR POULTRY

1. Entries will be received until such time as the cooping capacity is reached.
2. Efforts will be made to coop singly. The right is reserved to place in one coop more than one bird of the same variety if owned by the same exhibitor.
3. A bird can only compete for one prize, except as provided for in special awards.
4. Exhibitors must furnish a substantial water cup.
5. Entered specimen must be bona fide property of exhibitor and have been hatched in Pennsylvania.
6. During the continuance of the show, all birds will be examined carefully each day. Birds showing signs of disease will be segregated and properly cared for or returned to the owner at his expense.
7. Birds will be handled only by the judge or authorized Fair official.
8. Premiums will be awarded only on animals or birds exhibited in their proper classes.
9. Entries will be accepted and premiums paid only on breeds, varieties and colors listed under the conditions noted in the Fair's premium book.
10. The management reserves the right to reduce the number of entries from one party if the cooping facilities are exhausted.
11. All Pennsylvania poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, and pigeons entering an exhibition must bear a unique individual identification leg band (official state-issued leg bands are not required). Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader).
12. An owner-endorsed health certificate must accompany all Pennsylvania poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, ratites, and pigeons, and must include the following:
 - Name and location of exhibition; and
 - Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and
 - A statement that their entries and their flock of origin are free of evidence of contagious diseases;
 - Owner signature and date of that signature.
13. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
14. Avian Influenza Clean Testing and Verification (all samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian).
 - All poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites, (**pigeons excluded**) for exhibition must originate from a flock in good standing in the Pennsylvania Avian Influenza Monitored Flock program, or from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Avian Influenza Clean program (the flock must be on NPIP-it is not considered to be a clean flock if only coming from a clean breeder flock), and the birds must be accompanied by the most recent negative test report (copy acceptable). The NPIP or AI Mon. flock number must be noted on the report; **OR**
 - The birds must originate from a flock in which a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested negative for avian influenza within the 6 months prior to opening date of the exhibition and the birds must be accompanied by the negative test report (copy acceptable). If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds. **For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing, and the swabs must be tested using virus isolation techniques.**
15. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Testing and Verification (**pigeons and waterfowl excluded**). (All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian.

- All poultry, upland game birds, and ratites (***pigeons and waterfowl excluded***) must originate from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Program or from a flock in good standing in the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program and the birds must be accompanied by the most recent negative test report (copy acceptable). The NPIP number must be noted on the report for NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flocks. If bird-side testing was done, the 9-2 or state equivalent form must accompany the birds (copy acceptable); **OR**
- Individual birds (***pigeons and waterfowl excluded***) for exhibition must have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the negative test report (copy acceptable). The following age restrictions apply to comply with NPIP standards:
 - Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
 - Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.

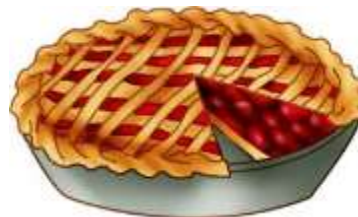
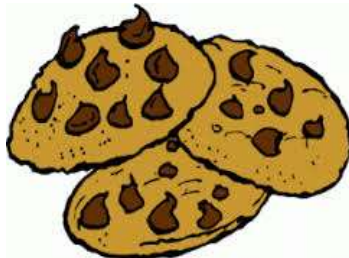

2019 PA Preferred™ Junior Baking Contest Cookies, Brownies and Bars

The goal of the PA Preferred™ Baking Contest is to encourage young people across the Commonwealth to participate in Pennsylvania’s agricultural fairs by showcasing Pennsylvania grown and produced products in their contest entries.

RULES:

1. Participant must be an individual amateur baker (ages 8 through 18) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred™ Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2019.
3. Entry must be a plate of six (6) individual sized portions of the baked entry item.
4. Entries must be made from scratch. Premade mixes are not acceptable ingredients.
5. At least two (2) PA Preferred™ ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients are PA Preferred™ grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
6. Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
7. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. **The PA Preferred™ ingredients must be listed clearly in the ingredient list, specifying the ingredient and the company that made/grew them (ex: PA Preferred Milk – Galliker’s brand).** Entrant’s name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
8. A PA Preferred™ logo is not required because not all PA Preferred™ products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient. For a list of acceptable products visit papreferred.com. Additionally, PA Preferred™ staff will assist in locating PA Preferred™ ingredients, as needed.

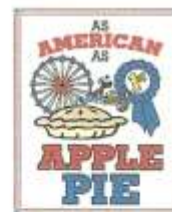
